The new Premier has reaffirmed the State Government's commitment to the new councils and confirmed that there will be no de-amalgamations. As we continue to become one unified organisation I would like to stress to all in our community that every decision Bayside Council has made, and will make, is guided by one principle – doing what's right for residents and ratepayers.

We look forward to working with our community in the coming months as we build on what we have started.

New Aquatic Centre Opens

Council's new Aquatic Centre in Bexley, named after the late Councillor Angelo Anestis, opened to the public on Australia Day 26 January 2017.

The Centre features a 25 metre 8-lane indoor pool, a 50 metre outdoor pool, health club, group fitness classes, and a children's splash pad and crèche.

Bayside Council Administrator Greg Wright said he was pleased the new centre was completed ahead of schedule and within budget.

"It's a rare thing these days to be able to say a project has been completed on time and budget," Mr Wright said "and I congratulate all involved who made this happen. The late Councillor Anestis would have been extremely proud."

"It was his *Notice of Motion* in 2008 that led to the construction of this

magnificent facility which is now being enjoyed by our residents and the wider community. It is very sad that he was not here for the opening," he said.

The new Aquatic Centre is open all year round and is easily accessible by car and bus.

Improved purchasing strategies

Bayside Council has established a new specialist team to provide a more strategic and contemporary approach in the way the Council procures its goods and se<u>rvices.</u>

Bayside has increased focus on strategic procurement and partnerships, supply chain management, contract management and governance controls by bringing together experienced and versatile staff into one team.

Administrator Greg Wright supports the initiative. "Providing an increased focus in procurement by a dedicated specialist team will ensure Bayside Council achieves best value outcomes for its business and community in accordance with Local Government requirements," he said.



New computer system

TechOne, Council's new corporate financial system, is up and running. The new system, which has been live for three months, tracks expenditure and is very user friendly.

Director of City Performance, Daniel Fabri, said there were a few minor teething problems in the early days which were quickly resolved and the Finance Team has made a seamless transition from the old Enterprise One system to TechOne.

"The new system simplifies reporting, streamlines processes and consolidates information making our financial information easier to track and more transparent," he said.

Meet Albert the Smart Tablet

Rockdale Customer Service Center has a new helper *Albert the Smart Tablet!* Albert is helping to reduce waiting times to pay bills or accounts by allowing customers to simply scan the barcode on their invoice and then use a credit or debit card to pay.

"It is that simple" Bayside Council Administrator Greg Wright said. "But if customers are unsure or need assistance with Albert, both the customer service and library staff can walk them through it. Albert will also email you a receipt or print you a hard copy."

Albert, named after the computer program, has been online for two weeks and Council's staff said the smart tablet option is popular with customers and has cut the waiting time significantly.



WORK DELAYED ON LINEAR PARK MASCOT



Work on transforming 0.9 hectares of unused land into Linear Park, Mascot, has temporarily stopped while Sydney Water and Bayside Council take steps to address an area of asbestos contamination found by contractors at the site.

Sydney Water, the owner of the land and Bayside Council the entity responsible for transforming the site into useable public space, will carry out further investigations in the immediate future, following which, it is anticipated that any required remediation will take place either before, or concurrently, with the development of Linear Park.

Council Administrator Mr Greg Wright said "Work on the site ceased immediately and it was secured to ensure that there was no public health risk. Sydney Water is now working with Council to try and determine the best means of addressing the contamination while moving forward with the project."

"Finding asbestos is a concern but I can assure everyone that Sydney Water and Council are treating the find seriously and in a responsible manner. We appreciate the public's patience while we carry out further investigations and address this issue. At the moment the work has stopped, the public is safe and we are working on resolving the issues with Sydney Water," he said.

Following further investigations and discussions with Sydney Water, the Council expects to be able to provide a further update to the community.

CONGRATULATIONS TO OUR CITIZENS OF THE YEAR



Bayside Council recognised three very special people on Australia Day when the Administrator Mr Greg Wright announced Council's annual Citizen of the Year Awards.

The Bayside Citizen of the Year for 2017 Mr Paul Graham is well known for his tireless work with the Windgap Foundation an organisation that supports people in the community with intellectual disabilities. He started working with the foundation more than 30 years ago and has since help raise funds through an annual St Patrick's Day breakfast, charity soccer game and has been instrumental in forming the Windgap Choir.

Mr Graham, who is also President of the Mascot RSL Sub Branch, successfully lobbied the State Government to have poppies projected onto the sails of the Sydney Opera House for Remembrance Day last year.

Joshua Del Prado was named the Young Citizen of the Year for his work in combating racism and injustice. The James Cook Boys Technology High School student presents workshops at schools and in the community to educate people on community harmony. He has also actively participated in making four antiracist films.

Shokatan Karate Champion, Ana Nikolovska was named Sportsperson of the Year. Ana has won many awards in her chosen sport, the most recent being at the 2016 Shotakan National Championships where she was placed first in the individual sparring event.

"Each one is a great ambassador for Council and our community," Mr Greg Wright said. "The Bayside Community salutes them and thanks them for their commitment and contribution."



INCREASING OUR SOLAR POWER

Bayside Council is committed to investing in energy conservation and moving to renewable energy to become a greener, more environmentally friendly and sustainable council where possible.

The latest investment has seen solar panels installed on the roof of the Bexley Depot.

"The move to solar power will save council around \$2000 a year," Administrator Mr Greg Wright said.

Bexley Depot brings the number of council owned buildings using solar power to four.

"The Mascot Administration Centre, Coronation Hall in Mascot and the Vera Lever Childcare Centre in Hillsdale are all doing their bit to reduce greenhouse gas emission," Mr Wright said.

"Solar powered fluorescent lights are also being used in local parks to improve community security and surveillance without adding to council's energy costs."



GM HONOURED

Bayside Council General Manager Meredith Wallace has been recognised as a 'woman of distinction' by the Organisation of Hellene and Hellene Cypriot Women of Australia (OEEGA) as part of their annual International Women's Day celebrations.

President of the OEEGA, Mrs Irene Anestis OAM, said they had chosen to recognise Ms Wallace because of her exceptional leadership and organisational skills in local government which she has used to benefit the local community and general public.

The OEEGA also recognised: The Lord Mayor of Sydney Clover Moore for her contribution to Local Government, Dr Efrosini Deligianni, a linguist specialising in Greek History and Mrs Catherine Valis for her work in the development of the Hellenic Lyceum, the most prestigious Greek Folkloric organisation in Australia and Europe.



Council is updating an aging fleet of vehicles and assets including heavy vehicles ranging from trucks, backhoes and sit-on-mowers. The cost of replacement is estimated at \$9 million. "The amalgamation has given the new Bayside Council an opportunity to explore all financial options to replace this aging fleet with new, safe vehicles," Administrator Greg Wright said.

Bayside Planning Panel to assess DA's



An independent panel of appropriately qualified persons has been set up by Council to assist with the determination of Development Applications and to provide recommendations on planning proposals.

The Independent Hearing and Assessment Panel (IHAP) will be known as the Bayside Planning Panel and it will be made up of three professionals with a strong background in planning and a pool of five community based representatives. The five community based representatives will ideally include one from each of the five council wards.

Bayside Council Administrator Mr Greg Wright said the Panel would assist in the determination of development applications, particularly those applications which are larger and more complex and attract considerable community attention.

"The independence and expertise of the Panel members will provide greater integrity in the decision making process of larger developments through transparency and public confidence," he said. "The panel will also improve the efficiency in the decision making process for all Development Applications."

"Council anticipates the panel will deal with around 120 applications of the 850 received. Of the remaining 730 Development Applications that are of a regional significance will continue to be dealt with by the State Government's Central District Planning Panel and small applications by Council staff under delegated authority."

Frequently Asked Questions

My gutters are blocked with leaves from trees that are not on my property why should I pay to have them cleaned?

The homeowner is responsible for clearing and maintaining the gutters around their home regardless of where the leaves may come from. You can ask your neighbour to trim their tree away from your property or if it is a street tree contact council and request the tree be trimmed. Council also suggests homeowners install gutter guards.

I have reported an abandoned vehicle and it has not been moved?

Council investigates all reports of abandoned vehicles but must follow a process. Firstly it must determine if the vehicle is registered.

If it is registered and parked legally it can remain parked for as long as the owner chooses. If it is not registered, then council must endeavour to contact the last known owner.

If contact is made and the owner claims the vehicle they are given notice to remove it. If it is not removed it is referred to the local police who then issue an infringement notice on an unregistered vehicle. Council does not have this authority. If no owner is found the vehicle is deemed to be abandoned and can be removed. The process can take up to six weeks.

Why can't I park in my driveway?

You can only park in your driveway if your vehicle is parked wholly within your property. If your vehicle is parked on the section of the driveway between your boundary and the roadway (as pictured below) it is parked on public property and therefore incurs a \$108 fine under the *Australian Road Rules Section 197 and 198.*



LOOKING FOR QUALITY CHILDCARE?

Bayside Council runs two Child Care Centres and a Family Day Care program.

The *Child Care Centres* located at Mascot and Hillsdale cater for eight weeks to five year olds and the hours of operation are strictly 7:30am to 6pm.

Family Day Care, where children are educated and cared for at the Educator's premises, caters for children from eight weeks old and the hours can be flexible. The *Family Day Care* program can also offer occasional care, before and after school care as well as vacation care.

All Educators, both in the centre based care and home based care, are qualified professionals who provide educational programs and activities for the children. Council's Children's Service Coordinator is happy to meet with and discuss options with families looking for child care. Visits to the *Child Care Centres* or a *Family Day Care* provider can be arranged.

Council also runs an interesting and entertaining Vacation Care program for working families. Vacation Care operates every school holidays out of Botany Public School, Botany. It provides activities and care for five to 12 year olds from 7am to 6pm.

The Baby Health Centre attached to the centre is now the new administration block for staff.

The former Baby Health Centre services run by Sydney Children's Hospital Network (Randwick and Westmead) has been relocated to the newly refurbished Baby Health Centre in Arthur Park, Botany.

FREE Child Immunisation

Bayside Council conducts free child immunisation clinics for children aged six weeks to four years old. Immunisation protects your child against measles, mumps, rubella, diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough, polio and hepatitis B. You will need to bring along you child's Blue Book and Medicare Card if you have one.

The dates for upcoming clinics are: 6 April, 4 May and 1 June. Clinics are held from 9am to 11am in Coronation Hall, corner Botany Road and Coward Street, Mascot (enter via Botany Road).
