Giant Crab finds home on bay

The big winner of the Bayside Arts Festival was Toowoomba based artist Joy Heylen who won the Sculpture Acquisition Prize for The Crab, a giant sculpture on display at Cook Park, Kyeemagh.

Council will pay \$44,800 to acquire the sculpture which is expected to remain on site at Cook Park, Kyeemagh. Council engineers have re-examined the sculpture to ensure it is properly secured.

The Bayside Arts Festival culminated in an awards ceremony at the Stamford Plaza Hotel, Sydney Airport on Friday 4 May when the winners of the various competitions run during the Festival were announced.

"The Bayside Arts Festival has been embraced by the community and continues to grow," Mayor Bill Saravinovski said.

"This Festival would not be possible without help from the community and I would like to congratulate the winners and thank everybody who has participated in the event."

Other big winners on the night were Yvonne Raulston who took out the CamerArt first prize and Kevin McKay the Visual Arts winner.

This year Bayside Arts Festival featured over 30 events comprising competitions, exhibitions, forums, workshops, theatrical performances, public art projects as well as a series of cultural events around Bayside.

Joy Heylen Biography

Joy Heylen was born in South Africa and studied Fine arts & 3D in New Zealand, from where her and her family migrated to Australia. Over the last 5 years Joy & her husband Patrick, have built Urban Visual Art & Sculpture up to be that of a professional Creative company, creating works that are a blend of engineered Art.

In pursuit of professional development, Joy is currently studying a double major, Fine Arts, and Visual Culture online through Curtin University.

"As an Artist, I am on a road of self-discovery; with life as the inspirational palette for contemplation. Mediums change and create frequencies for the journey to follow."

Joy Heylen, is a guileless passionate Sculptor who covers untrodden, newfangled territory with childlike enthusiasm. Her journey of self-discovery has taken her across three countries, Australia, New Zealand & South Africa, with explorative works encompassing photography, fine art & sculpture. Her work is inventive with solid engineering, balancing the conceptual with the pursuit of ideal aesthetic purity.

As an immigrant to Australia immersion in cultures through Art is the technique, she has engaged in the evolution of her sense of social justice. She is also an extremely avid mentor, and within the scope of her Art practice, she mentors young and emerging artists.

The inspiration for the Crab sculpture is a play on scale; Creating a GIANT momentous presence of a crustacean. The performance of Corten steel blended with laser cut organic inspired patterns, capture industrial engineering and design concepts which fuse feminine and masculine intrigue. Corten, which is high tensile steel creates the strength in steel, and the orange colour of the steel changes naturally in the marine environment, complete with lighting within the Crab showing the luminosity of the soul.

The sculpture colloquially called 'Big Bertha' has travelled far and wide in Australia and has been further developed to create a narrative about the red crab migration unique to Australia with animatronic moving baby crabs.
